BOARD MEETING GUIDELINES

1. The Board of Education is a statutorily constituted body engaged in public education. The Board acts in accordance with the authority and responsibility vested in it by law. The Board may seek advice and suggestions from the public but may not abdicate its legal responsibility to make decisions.

2. Board of Education meetings are scheduled to consider and act upon specific items of business as listed on the agenda made available to the public at the beginning of each meeting.

3. The Board has set aside time at the monthly open meetings when residents may address the Board. This time is listed on the agenda. A person wishing to speak must sign in prior to the meeting commencing. The resident will be requested to record his or her name and address, the organization, if any, that he or she represents, and the agenda item or topic to be discussed.

4. Questions should be directed to the president of the Board. Every effort will be made to provide answers based upon available factual information. Questions requiring a review of policies or information not immediately available to the Board or to the school administrators present at a meeting will be referred for study and replied to at a future date.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education has seven members, each elected for a term of three years. Candidates for the Board must be qualified voters of the school district and are nominated by petition. Such petitions shall be directed to the clerk of the school district, and shall be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the district or 2 percent of the number of voters who voted in the previous election, whichever is greater.

DISTRICT PROFILE

The Deer Park Union Free School District encompasses 5½ square miles in the Town of Babylon and serves approximately 37,000 residents. There are five public schools in the district: Deer Park High School (9-12), Robert Frost Middle School (6-8), John F. Kennedy Intermediate School (3-5), John Quincy Adams Primary School (Pre-K-2) and May Moore Primary School (Pre-K-2). Total enrollment (Pre-K through 12) is approximately 4,300 students.

VOTING/REGISTRATION

Qualified residents vote each year on the annual school budget and the election of Board of Education members. The budget covers the operation and maintenance of the schools for one fiscal year, from July 1 to June 30.

Those who are registered to vote in general elections are allowed to vote in school district elections, even if they are not registered within the district.

The polling place for registration and voting is the Deer Park High School gymnasium at 1 Falcon Place in Deer Park.

Residents are qualified to vote in a school district election if they are: (a) citizens of the United States; (b) 18 years of age and over; (c) residents of the school district for 30 days prior to the date of voting; and (d) registered voters.

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
VISITORS TO THE SCHOOLS

The Board recognizes that the success of the school program depends, in part, on support by the larger community. The Board wishes to foster a positive climate where members of the community have the opportunity to observe the hard work and accomplishments of the students, teachers and other staff. Since schools are a place of work and learning, certain limits must be set for such visits. The principal or his or her designee is responsible for all persons in the building and on the grounds. For these reasons, the following rules apply to visitors to the schools:

- 1. Anyone who is not a regular staff member or student of the school will be considered a visitor.
- 2. All visitors should call in advance, whenever possible, and make an appointment with the school employee they wish to visit.
- 3. All visitors to the school must enter through the designated single point of entry and show identification before entering. Upon verification of purpose of visit, admission will be granted. Upon entry, they will be required to sign the visitor's register and will be issued a visitor's identification badge, which must be worn at all times while in the school or on school grounds. The visitor must return the identification badge to the security desk before leaving the building.
- 4. Visitors attending school functions after regular school hours that are open to the public, such as parent teacher organization meetings or public gatherings, are not required to register, but must have proper ID readily available.
- 5. Visitors should not expect to take class time to discuss individual matters.
- 6. Any unauthorized person on school property will be reported to the principal. Unauthorized persons will be asked to leave. The police may be called if the situation warrants.
- 7. All visitors are expected to abide by the rules for public conduct on school property contained in the code of conduct, found on the district's website.
- 8. School facilities and grounds are primarily for the use of students. They are not available for public use during the hours that school programs are in progress.

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PARKING/FIRE LANE PUBLIC NOTICE

Access onto school premises for fire and emergency service equipment must be provided at all times by clear, unobstructed access roads and/or designated fire lanes in accordance with the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code 1161.2. Pathways from exit doors and rescue windows must remain clear and unobstructed for easy evacuation. Parking areas have been designated for your convenience. Please abide by all parking rules and regulations (handicapped stalls, fire zones, etc.). Please be advised that the Town of Babylon will issue tickets for illegally parked vehicles.

CONTINGENCY EMERGENCY CLOSING DAYS

Contingency Make-up Day #1 is April 10, 2017. Contingency Make-up Day #2 is April 11, 2017. School will be in session on these days if more than four snow days are used. In the event all snow days are not used, the district has the right to close for an extra day around the Memorial Day weekend.

TELEPHONE ALERT SYSTEM

The district utilizes a telephone alert system called "School Messenger." The system enables the district to automatically send prerecorded phone messages to all Deer Park School District parents in a matter of minutes. It is commonly used to get important messages to parents in a timely manner, such as a school closure or school emergency.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation is provided in our district for students in kindergarten through grade 12 based on where they live in relation to the location of the school they are attending. **The following students are eligible for transportation to and from school**: students enrolled in kindergarten-grade 2 residing a distance of 1/4 mile or greater from their school; students in grades 3-5 residing a distance of 1/2 mile or greater from their school; students in grades 6-8 residing a distance of 1 mile or greater from their school; and students enrolled in grades 9-12 who reside a distance of 1.5 miles or greater from Deer Park High School.

Transportation eligibility according to distance limits is determined by careful measurement to provide absolute accuracy. We adhere scrupulously to the State Education Law and mileage limits adopted by the Board of Education and cannot make exceptions. All requests for nonpublic school transportation for the 2017-2018 school year must be filed no later than April 1, 2017.

Bus passes are issued to all students eligible for transportation and will be checked regularly. Students will not be admitted on a bus without a pass. The bus drivers are not responsible for the supervision of children before the child enters or after the child exits the bus. Therefore, for younger children in particular, it is imperative that an adult be present to receive them.

BUS TRANSPORTATION STUDENT RULES

- 1. The driver is in charge of the bus. Follow the driver's instructions.
- 2. Be on time at your bus stop. The bus will not wait for you.
- 3. Stand back from the street and wait for the bus to stop. Form a line before approaching the bus at your stop.
- 4. Speak in a normal tone and do not use offensive language.
- 5. Do not push, shove or fight on the bus or while you are waiting at your stop.
 - 6. Board the bus in an orderly fashion and go directly to your seat.
 - 7. Do not litter, write on or damage the bus in any way.
- 8. Remain seated while the bus is moving.
- 9. Keep all parts of your body and all objects inside the bus.
- 10. If you cross the street when you get off the bus, wait for the driver to signal that it is safe to cross. Always cross in front of the bus, never behind it.
- 11. No eating, drinking or smoking is permitted on the bus.
- 12. No unauthorized passengers are permitted to ride. Your bus pass is your ticket.
 - Failure to comply with these rules could lead to a suspension or loss of bus rider privileges.

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SEX OFFENDER NOTIFICATIONS

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION

The Deer Park Union Free School District has developed an integrated pest management program (IPM) for managing, preventing and suppressing pests with minimal impact on human health, the environment and nontarget organisms. Pesticides are only used as a last resort. If pesticides are needed, the least-toxic pest-specific alternative is selected.

This notice is intended to advise you as required by Section 409-h of the Education Law that:

- Pesticide products may be used periodically throughout the school year.
- This district is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians and staff who wish to receive 48-hour written notice of an actual pesticide application.



- If an emergency exists that necessitates an emergency application, a good faith effort will be made to provide advance notification.
- Certain pesticide applications are exempt from the notification process.

OFFICIAL ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

As required by law every three years, the Triennial Asbestos Inspection of the Deer Park School District is scheduled for September 2016. Each inspection is performed in accordance with 40 CRF 763.85 and based on the EPA's (Environmental Protection Agency) publication, "A Guide to Performing Reinspections Under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act" (AHERA). INTERNET POLICY

The Deer Park Union Free School District believes that the use of the Internet is an integral part of the educational process. Therefore, it should be viewed as a teaching and learning resource, as are approved textbooks and other curriculum-based tools.

The Deer Park Union Free School District utilizes Internet-filtering software to assist in the prevention of inappropriate sites and materials reaching the student. We believe that the best vigilance is provided by the professional and lay staff in our employ.

Should a parent/guardian wish for their child not to have access to this valuable resource, they may do so by not signing the Acceptable Use Policy form which is available in all our schools or on the district's website under the IT section. If they wish to rescind a previous Acceptable Use Policy, they may submit a letter to the building principal.

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STUDENT BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

The district is committed to safeguarding personal and confidential information about its students. Some information about students is considered "directory information" and may be released by the district without prior consent of the parents. This includes: names, names of parents, grade, major field of study, participation in recognized school activities, extracurricular activities, sports programs, academic honors, achievements, awards, scholarships and similar information, including pictures or photographs. Schools will make every effort to inform parents when requests for information are made.

Parents who do not desire release or publication of this information must make a specific request, in writing, to the superintendent of schools by Sept. 15, 2016. Failure to make such a request will be deemed implied consent.

ACCESS TO STUDENT RECORDS:

Parents and eligible students (at least 18 years of age or attending a postsecondary educational institution) are entitled to inspect and review any and all educational records related to themselves or their children, including the right to challenge the content of the information, and to correct any misleading or inaccurate information.

TITLE I: RIGHT TO KNOW

Under the provisions of the Every Student Succeeds Act, parents of children receiving Title I funds (May Moore, John Quincy Adams and John F. Kennedy) have a right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of their student's classroom teachers. Please address a letter of request to the child's principal. See the district website for more information.

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT

New York State Law Chapter 1039 added a new Title VI, Section 411, Child Protective Services Act to the Social Services Law. Its purpose is to encourage a more complete reporting of suspected child abuse/ maltreatment and to establish in each county a Child Protective Service capable of investigating such reports swiftly and completely and of providing protection for the child from further such situations.

The law mandates that school personnel report suspected cases to the New York State Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment.

DASA, SECTION 504 AND TITLE IX

The Board of Education, its officers and employees shall not discriminate in its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sex, sexual orientation or gender (including gender identity/expression). The district will provide notice of this policy in accordance with federal and state law and regulation.

The district provisions prohibit discrimination and harassment against any student by employees, employees by student, or students on school property or at a school function, that creates a hostile environment by conduct, with or without physical contact and/or by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse, of such a severe nature that has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's or employee's performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional and/or physical well-being.

Assistant Superintendent for Pupil Personnel Services James Cummings has been designated to handle inquiries regarding the district's nondiscrimination policies. His contact information is available on the district website. Complaints of sexual harassment or discrimination are covered by Policies 0110 and 0115. Complaint forms can be found on the district website under the District tab.

All complainants and those who participate in the investigation of a complaint in conformity with state law and district policies, who have acted reasonably and in good faith, have the right to be free from retaliation of any kind.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Students should not wear jewelry or other expensive personal items to school, nor should these items be stored in lockers. Storage of these items in lockers is the personal responsibility of the student. The school district is not responsible for loss or theft.

SUSPENSIONS/PENALTIES

Parents and students should be aware of policies regarding cutting and/or suspensions. The student handbook contains complete details of all rules and regulations. Review this document carefully with your child and check the district website for further information found in the Code of Conduct.

CELLPHONE USE IN SCHOOL

Students are prohibited from using cellphones/ headphones during instructional time unless authorized by their classroom teacher. Please discourage use during this time. Parents can contact their child by calling the main office.

REPORT CARDS

Report cards on pupils in all grades are issued three times a year (elementary) or four times a year (secondary), except for kindergarten pupils, who receive one evaluation in the fall and one in the spring, and can be accessed via the parent portal.

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PREKINDERGARTEN PROGRAM

The district's prekindergarten program is a child-centered, literacybased program that takes a hands-on, play-oriented approach to learning experiences. Children are exposed to reading, writing, math, science, social studies, music and art through small-group activities such as dramatic and symbolic play, block play, water play, cooking, tasting, eating, cooperative playground activities, field trips and much more.

Parental involvement is always appreciated and highly encouraged. Each class meets for two and a half hours, five days a week, including a snack in both the morning and afternoon sessions.

The program, which is limited to children who will be 4 years old on or before Dec. 1, who are not age-eligible for kindergarten and who are Deer Park residents, is tuition-free to participating families.



KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Requirements for Entrance:

- A child must be 5 years of age on or before Dec. 1 of the entering year.
- Proof of age, original birth certificate and proof of residency must be submitted at the time of registration.
- Proof of Immunizations: New York State Compulsory Immunization Law requires that any child enrolling in school for the first time have a physician's certificate stating that the child has been immunized. A complete listing of the required immunizations and New York State regulations can be viewed on pages 38-39 of this calendar.

NOTE: Secular and/or scientific principles, including philosophical exemptions, are not allowed.

Kindergarten registration takes place during the month of February. The schedule can be obtained in January.

In order to protect the health of all Deer Park students, it is recommended that any students traveling to countries where communicable diseases may be contracted obtain all necessary immunizations before undertaking such travel.

School District Directory & Calendar

CENTRAL REGISTRATION

All incoming students who will be attending school in the Deer Park School District must register at the Office of Central Registration located at the Administration Building at 1881 Deer Park Ave., Deer Park, NY 11729.

Please call 631-274-4372 to schedule an appointment as necessary.

Prior to your appointment, please complete the online application at www.deerparkschools.org. Go to the Departments tab, click on Central Registration, then select Registration Packet. Fill in all required fields.

Before a student is enrolled in the Deer Park school system, the following entrance requirements must be met:

- 1. Student must be registered by a parent or a legal guardian. (Proof of legal guardianship must be presented to school registrar.)
- 2. Proof of Residency: (One of the following items below must include the name and address of the parent or legal guardian.)a. Mortgage documents
 - b. Homeowners insurance policy
 - c. Property tax bill

d. Current utility bill (gas, water, phone or electric)

*If you are in a rental situation, you must have all of the following as listed:

- a. Landlord affidavit
- b. Property tax statement from homeowner
- c. Proof of your residence at the Deer Park address – two of the following items:
- 1) Current utility bill
- 2) Social Services paperwork
- 3) Medical or automobile insurance document
- 3. Proof of birth date (one of the following):
 - a. Original birth certificate b. Passport
- 4. Proof of a physical exam within one year of enrollment.
- 5. Proof of all immunizations and vaccines, signed and stamped by a physician licensed to practice in New York State. A list of required immunizations can be viewed on pages 38-39.



6. Present transfer document releasing student from former school. (New York City Schools issue release cards.)

7. Final report card from prior district.

Registration is not complete until all necessary information and documentation is provided to the school your child will attend.

Falsification of residency documentation will result in exclusion from the Deer Park School District and financial liability for appropriated tuition costs.

If you are aware of a student or students attending our schools who are not district residents, please leave a message at 631-274-4133. All calls will remain anonymous.

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PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

In order to support services for students whose educational needs require special attention, the office of pupil personnel services provides professional assistance through the following programs: health services, psychological and social worker services, guidance and counseling, speech and language therapy, special education classes, attendance, home instruction, special education testing and evaluation, special transportation, the Committee on Special Education (CSE), and the Committee on Preschool Special Education (CPSE).

HEALTH SERVICES

Our district health services provide for the emergency care of pupils who become ill or injured while under school jurisdiction. School nurses also obtain and transmit medical information for special school programs and for monitoring of pupils with specific health problems. Additionally, they work with school staff and community agencies in maintaining healthful school environments.

In case of an emergency or when a child becomes ill during school hours, the school nurse will contact parents. It is important that parents complete the Household Verification Form, which provides the school with the name, address and telephone number of a person who can take care of the child if the parent cannot be located. Please also update your email address. In addition, the name of the child's physician should be on file with his or her school health office in case of an emergency. State law prohibits the school nurse or other school personnel from administering medication to a child without a doctor's note. A parental request is NOT sufficient.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Health education has been mandated by the state for grade levels K-12.

The Deer Park School District has developed an AIDS curriculum, taught primarily in health classes. The curriculum deals with three areas:

- 1) What the disease is
- 2) How it is transmitted, and
- 3) Means of prevention.

By law, parents may have their child excluded from the prevention portion of the curriculum only. A written letter requesting the exclusion of the child must be sent to the building principal of the school the child attends.

IMMUNIZATIONS

In order to protect the health of all Deer Park students, it is recommended that any students traveling to countries where communicable diseases may be contracted, obtain all necessary immunizations before undertaking such travel.

For a complete listing of required immunizations, please refer to pages 38-39.

PHYSICAL/DENTAL EXAMINATIONS

New York State Education Law mandates that all new entrants and children in the following grades have a physical and dental examination by a licensed doctor: pre-K, kindergarten, second, fourth, seventh and 10th.

ATHLETIC EXAMINATIONS

All students participating in competitive athletics, cheerleading or kickline must have an annual, comprehensive physical examination by their family physician or by the school physician before participating in school sports. A health history update must also be completed before each sport and kept on file in the school health office.

PSYCHOLOGICAL/SOCIAL WORK SERVICES

Referrals for psychological and social work services are made by staff and parents. Psychologists offer consultation for referrals and are available for CSE diagnostic evaluations and to provide assistance for children whose learning difficulties or personal maladjustments seriously impact their school performance. When necessary, the services of the school social workers are included. Consultation services are then offered to parents and staff members in planning for individual pupils.

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PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES (CONTINUED)

SCHOOL GUIDANCE COUNSELORS

Our school guidance counselors help to identify specific needs of students; encourage better interpersonal relationships; promote positive attitudes and choices; aid teachers and parents in helping students; assist families in making use of community resources; review test results to provide information about abilities, needs, achievements and interests; assist students with the maturation process; coordinate efforts with other school agencies; facilitate discussions with student groups; assist with in-service staff development for faculty; participate in curriculum development; lend support to school, career and personal plans; maintain confidences; and provide "preventative" counseling. School counselors are available to all secondary students through self-referral, teacher referral, parent referral, administrative referral, referral by a friend and psychological referral. Working papers are also available in the high school guidance office.

SPEECH/LANGUAGE/HEARING

The district's speech, language and hearing specialists are available to help pupils improve their speech and language and to help diagnose expressive and receptive language problems that impede learning.



COMMITTEE ON SPECIAL EDUCATION AND PRESCHOOL SPECIAL EDUCATION

Students who are suspected of having an educationally disabling condition, as defined in the regulations of the commissioner of education, are evaluated by the Committee on Special Education. Children who are receiving special education services are reviewed by this committee on an annual basis.

Referrals to the Committee on Preschool Special Education should be forwarded to the office of special education and pupil personnel services.

SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASSES

Classes are conducted at all grade levels for students who have special education needs. The intensity of service depends upon the prescribed recommendation of the student's Individualized Education Program (IEP). The students in our various programs are instructed and/or supported by certified special education personnel.

HOME INSTRUCTION

Children who will be absent from school for a prolonged period of time due to illness or injury may be eligible to receive home on-site or virtual online instruction. Parents who wish to apply for such home instruction should secure the necessary application from the school nurse. A doctor's statement indicating the diagnosis, the estimated length of illness and assurance that the student is not contagious is required as part of the application.

The presence of an adult in the home is required during each on-site home tutoring session. A brief illness of a student can be covered by homework assignments obtained from teachers. At the secondary level, home tutoring either at home or virtually is necessary in order to meet the requirements of the district attendance policy.

New York State Immunization Requirements for School Entrance/Attendance¹

NOTES: Children in a prekindergarten setting should be age-appropriately immunized. The number of doses depends on the schedule recommended by the Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices (ACIP). For grades pre-K through 7, intervals between doses of vaccine should be in accordance with the ACIP-recommended immunization schedule for persons 0 through 18 years of age (*exception*: intervals between doses of polio vaccine only need to be reviewed for grades kindergarten, 1, 6 and 7). Doses received before the minimum age or intervals are not valid and do not count toward the number of doses listed below. Intervals between doses of vaccine DO NOT need to be reviewed for grades 8 through 12. See footnotes for specific information for each vaccine. Children who are enrolling in gradeless classes should meet the immunization requirements of the grades for which they are age equivalent. Dose requirements MUST be read with the footnotes of this schedule.

- vaccine. (Minimum age: 6 weeks.) a. Children starting the series on time should receive a five-dose series of DTaP vaccine at ages 2, 4, 6, 15 through 18 months, and 4 years of age or older. The fourth dose may be received as early as age 12 months, provided at least six months have elapsed since the third dose. However, the fourth dose of DTaP need not be repeated if it was administered at least four months after the third dose of DTaP. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday.
- b. If the fourth dose of DTaP was administered at age 4 years or older, the fifth (booster) dose of DTaP vaccine is not required.
- c. For children born before Jan. 1, 2005, only immunity to diptheria is required and doses of DT and Td can meet this requirement
- d. Children ages 7 through 10 years who are not fully immunized with the childhood DTaP vaccine series should receive Tdap vaccine as the first dose in the catch-up series; if additional doses are needed, use Td vaccine. A Tdap vaccine (or incorrectly administered DTaP vaccine) received at 7 years or age or older will meet the sixth-grade Tdap requirement.
- e. For children 7 years of age or older who received the first dose on or after their first birthday, the immunization requirement is three doses. If the first dose was received before their first birthday, then four doses are required.
- 3. Tetanus and diphtheria toxoids and acellular pertussis (Tdap) vaccine. (Minimum age: 7 years.)
- a. Students 11 years of age or older entering grades 6 through 12 are required to have one dose of Tdap. A dose received at 7 years of age or older will meet this requirement.
- b. Students who are 10 years old in grade 6 and who have not vet received a Tdap vaccine are in compliance until they turn 11 years of age.
- 4. Poliovirus vaccine (IPV/OPV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks.)
- a. Children starting the series on time should receive a series of IPV at ages 2, 4, 6 through 18 months, and 4 years of age or older. The final dose in the series must be received on or after the fourth birthday and at least six months after the previous dose.
- b. For students who received their fourth dose before age 4 and prior

- to Aug. 7, 2010, four doses separated by at least four weeks is sufficient.
- c. If the third dose of polio vaccine was received at age 4 years or older, and at least six months after first dose, the fourth dose of polio vaccine is not necessary.
- 5. Measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months.)
- a. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (four weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
- b. Students in grades kindergarten through 12 must have received two doses of measles-containing vaccine, two doses of mumpscontaining vaccine and at least one dose of rubella-containing vaccine.
- c. One dose of MMR is required for prekindergarten.
- 6. Hepatitis B vaccine
- a. Dose 1 may be given at birth or anytime thereafter. Dose 2 must be received at least four weeks (28 days) after dose 1. Dose 3 must be at least eight weeks after dose 2 AND at least 16 weeks after dose 1 AND no earlier than 24 weeks of age.
- b. Two doses of adult hepatitis B vaccine (Recombivax) received at least four months apart at age 11 through 15 years will meet the requirement.
- 7. Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. (Minimum age: 12 months.)
- a. The first dose of varicella vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday. The second dose must have been received at least 28 days (four weeks) after the first dose to be considered valid.
- b. For children aged less than 13 years, the recommended minimum interval between doses is three months (if the second dose was administered at least four weeks after first dose, it can be accepted as valid); for persons aged 13 years and older, the minimum interval between doses is four weeks.
- 8. Meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MenACWY). (Minimum age: 6 weeks.)
- a. One dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (Menactra or Menevo) is required for students entering grade 7.
- b. For students in grade 12, if the first dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine was received at age 16 years or older, the second (booster) dose is not required.
- 9. Haemophilus influenzae type B conjugate vaccine (Hib). (Minimum age: 6 weeks.)
- a. Children starting the series on time should receive Hib vaccine at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and 12 through 15 months of age

Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months of age.

- b. If two doses of vaccine were received before 12 months of age, only three doses are required with dose 3 at 12 through 15 months of age and at least eight weeks after dose 2.
- c. If dose 1 was received at ages 12 through 14 months of age, only two doses are required with dose 2 at least eight weeks after dose 1.
- d. If dose 1 was received at 15 months of age or older, only one dose is required.
- e. Hib vaccine is not required for children 5 years of age or older. 10. Pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV). (Minimum age: 6 weeks.)
- a. Children starting the series on time should receive PCV vaccine at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6 months and 12 through 15 months of age. Children older than 15 months must get caught up according to the ACIP catch-up schedule. The final dose must be received on or after 12 months of age.
- b. Unvaccinated children 7 through 11 months of age are required to receive two doses, at least four weeks apart, followed by a third dose at age 12 through 15 months.
- c. Unvaccinated children 12 through 23 months of age are required to receive two doses of vaccine at least eight weeks apart.
- d. If one dose of vaccine was received at 24 months of age or older, no further doses are required.

2. College Fair

Deer Park's annual college fair is scheduled in the spring at Deer Park High School. Every district parent and student is invited to attend. There will be representatives present from many public and private colleges to answer questions and distribute information.



3. College Applications Applications for State University (SUNY), City University (CUNY) and Nassau and Suffolk Community Colleges are usually available by early fall in the school counseling office and college/career center. Students applying elsewhere should write, call or email the college directly to obtain an application, catalog and financial aid/ scholarship information. Many colleges also accept the Common Application, which is available online. Seniors are reminded to pick up teacher recommendation forms from the school counseling office and to submit a completed activities résumé to the office in September. Applications cannot be processed completely without these forms. Appointments must be made with the counselor to review the first college application submitted.

4. Financial Aid

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which will be available in the school counseling office in December, must be submitted in order to apply for any government financial tuition assistance. This form cannot be mailed until Jan. 1, 2017. Seniors who anticipate graduating in January and starting college next spring should file last year's FAFSA form as soon as possible. The CSS Profile financial aid form, required by some private colleges, is available in September in the school counseling office. A Scholarship Bulletin is mailed to the homes of every senior on a quarterly basis during the year. It contains information on scholarship eligibility criteria, instructions for applying and application deadlines. Many of the applications are available in the school counseling office. There will be a Financial Aid Night for parents and students in mid-December at the high school.

5. National Collegiate Athletic Association

NCAA eligibility clearinghouse forms can be obtained in the school counseling office or online at ncaa.org. Students who plan to play Division I or II intercollegiate athletics must be certified eligible by the NCAA. A processing fee must accompany the form when mailed.

6. Class Rank and Transcripts

An official copy of a senior's academic record (transcript) will be mailed as part of the application packet to colleges. It will include a student's rank, or his or her academic standing compared with other students in the same graduating class. All seniors (students with more than 15 credits) who have attended Deer Park High School for two full years prior to the start of 12th grade are ranked (please see the course catalog on the high school website for course weighting). A student copy of the transcript is mailed to the homes of all seniors in late August. Please check it carefully. Any discrepancies must be discussed with your child's counselor before the deadline mentioned in the accompanying letter. Rank and average will be available on or about mid-September.

Seniors can see their counselors to find out their rank after that date.

7. Sara S. Carpenter College/Career Center The school counseling department operates a full-service college/career center adjacent to the attendance office. Information on colleges and career fields is available in the form of books, brochures, videos, catalogs and disks. Applications for many colleges, scholarships and SAT and ACT testing may also be obtained at the center. College representatives visit the center to meet with students on an individual or small-group basis. The center is manned by school counselors five periods a day and is open an additional period on most days. Anyone wishing to use the center before or after the regular high school day should contact the school counseling office at 631-274-4157.

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SCOPE 2016-2017 BEFORE- AND AFTER-SCHOOL CHILD CARE PROGRAM

The Deer Park School District and SCOPE (Suffolk County Organization for the Promotion of Education) will be providing financially self-supporting before- and after-school child care programs for the district's kindergarten through fifth-grade students and an after-school-only program for sixth-grade students during the 2016-2017 school year.

The program, which is licensed by the New York State Department of Social Services, offers a safe, fun, caring environment for children of working parents. Students are provided with a healthy snack and given an opportunity to complete their homework assignments. Children participate in a variety of age-appropriate recreational and quiet activities including arts and crafts, club days and enrichment opportunities. The program will operate on all full school days. The Before-School Program will operate from 7 a.m. until the start of school. The After-School Program will begin at the time of dismissal and run until 6:30 p.m. The district will run the program at John F. Kennedy Intermediate School. Transportation will be provided by the district.

The Before-School Program fees include a monthly rate of \$140 for a child to attend the program 10 or fewer days per month, with a fee of \$14 for each additional day. The alternative would be the full-time monthly rate of \$240, which covers the child for the 182 school calendar days beginning in September. The After-School Program fees include a minimum monthly rate of \$173 for a child to attend the program 10 or fewer days per month, with a fee of \$17.30 for each additional day. The alternative would be the full-time monthly rate of \$17.30 for each additional day. The alternative would be the full-time monthly rate of \$304, which covers the child for the 182 school calendar days beginning in September. The monthly fee for a child to attend both programs every day is \$528. There will be a \$40 annual nonrefundable registration fee (for the first child) and \$20 for each additional child when you first sign up. There are special discount rates of 20 percent for each additional child in the same family. Subsidies are available for incoming eligible families.

Parents may pick up registration applications in the main office at each elementary school. Mail the completed registration form along with registration fee to SCOPE Student Services – Registration, 100 Lawrence Ave., Smithtown, NY 11787. For further information, parents may call the SCOPE office at 631-360-0800, ext. 100, between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

DEER PARK AQUATIC CENTER

The Deer Park High School Aquatic Center hosts district physical education and water safety programs as well as girls and boys varsity swim teams, a coed junior high swim team, and a variety of community programs and public swimming hours held outside of school hours. The facility houses a six-lane, 25-meter racing pool and a separate diving tank with 1-meter and 3-meter diving boards located inside the back of the high school building near the track and athletic fields.




